Eta Aquariids April 15th, 2022 to May 27th, 2022

Next Peak night May 4-5, 2022

The Eta Aquariids are a strong shower when viewed from the southern tropics. From the equator northward, they usually only produce medium rates of 10-30 per hour just before dawn. Activity is good for a week centered the night of maximum activity. These are swift meteors that produce a high percentage of persistent trains, but few fireballs.

News Worth Digging Up

Diamonds In Meteorite May Come From 'Lost' Planet

A meteorite discovered in 2008 has an unusual composition may provide valuable insights into the early history of our solar system. The meteorite belongs to a rare category of space rocks (called ureilites) that contain relatively large amounts of graphite and diamond. An analysis of this meteorite's diamonds by Dr. Gilbert and his team revealed tiny imperfections that provide clues about the gems' origins. Scientist determined that the meteorite is about 4.5 billion years old and hails from a time when protoplanets, or planets in their early stages of evolution, orbited our sun. These protoplanets collided with one another to form the planets of our current solar system.

The rock's special chemistry isn't the only reason scientists are excited. It also contains the largest meteorite diamonds ever discovered. Diamonds of this size and composition could only be created under extreme pressure. These conditions could only be achieved inside a planet the size of Mercury or Mars, providing more evidence that the meteorite comes from a 'lost' planet. Earthquakes in South Carolina

Three earthquakes were recorded in Elgin on Monday May 9, 2022. At around 1:32 a.m., a 3.29 magnitude earthquake was measured 6 kilometers east of Elgin. Then at 4:39 a.m., a 1.6 magnitude earthquake was recorded 8 kilometers east southeast of Elgin, according to the United States Geological Survey. The third earthquake, measuring in at a 1.79 magnitude, was recorded at 5:10 a.m. 6 kilometers east southeast of Elgin. The third earthquake makes 24, low-magnitude earthquakes recorded in the state this year, and the 26th recorded in the area since December 27, 2021, according to the SC Emergency Management Division.
