She also brought a variety of gorgeous specimens to show the club. Thank you Chris!

Programs: Sue is coordinating programs and board members are supporting her in any way we can. The May meeting will be by Cindy Lee from the Palmetto Seashell Club. The June meeting will be a silent auction. If you would like to auction anything, feel free to bring it to the June meeting and either share the proceeds with the club, or keep the proceeds for yourself.

EXECUTIVE MEETING MINUTES

April 28, 2025, Board Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society, Inc. held its monthly board meeting on April 28th, 2025, at Grecian Gardens at 2312 Sunset Blvd. Members in attendance were Patricia Stidom, Tom Stidom, Jim Cobb, Ron Ahle, Steve Coker, Cheryl Coker, Gary Hert, Sharon Sterret, Casey Tyler, and Sophie Grimsley. President Patricia Stidom called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM.

Old Business: The society has been looking into doing a fall or spring picnic. Sesquicentennial park has nothing available on weekend mornings this spring. Patricia talked to Gibson Pond about doing the event on May 24th. We have some fall field trips coming up and Patricia would like to confirm the dates for these trips so that we can pick a fall picnic date. Casey mentioned that Arkansas will be September 8th to 14th. Patricia will look for possible dates in Sesquicentennial SP on weekends in October.

New Business: Tom passed out a copy of the CGMS constitution which highlighted Section II which states that no society assets shall result in the profit of any individual. There are concerns about having this statement without exception statements, such as reasonable compensation. The board members also discussed liability insurance for field trips. The insurance covers just field trip location owners and liability for the club, not for the members attending. It was noted that field trip attendees must be club members. Our welcome letter states that attendees are covered by insurance when on field trips. Board members discussed removing this sentence from the letter. Steve also wants to know what the policy specifically covers. This policy should be on the Google workspace.

Membership: Sheila wants someone to take over this position. **Programs:** Sue Shrader is still in charge of programs, but we would like to take as much off of her plate as possible. If we can find someone to take over this position that would be the best option. **Social Media:** Need to alter the constitution to create a Social Media Committee. Asif has volunteered to run the Social Media team.

Show Committee: Angela was not present at the meeting and there were no updates. Sue has finished putting together the flyers and postcard information. There will be no meeting this month and next month is to be determined. Notes from the previous meeting were sent out. Olga will be the co-chair of the show planning committee. **Workshop:** Gary Hart stated that the slab saw needs oil. Jim made a motion to purchase the oil, Sophie seconded the motion, and the motion passed with a vote. **Faceting:** Tom Daniels was not present, so no updates were given. Patricia mentioned that the club does not have a faceting machine. The board members decided that this issue could be solved later since we currently do not have space to setup a faceting machine.

EXECUTIVE MEETING MINUTES (continuation 1)

Field Trips: Casey gave a rundown of upcoming fieldtrips. There will be a gold panning trip on May 10th at 11 AM in Union, SC at 136 Pine Lane. There will be a \$10 suggested donation. The property is an animal sanctuary with two creeks running through it. A Graves Mountain field trip is scheduled for May 31st. Casey will confirm with Graves owner as we get closer to the trip date. Ron would like some info to put in the Rocky Trails about upcoming field trips.

Sunshine: Abbie Gates is stepping down from this position. Sheila Frame will take over when the membership position she currently holds is filled.

Website: Steve sent another e-mail out today to try and get website ownership transferred to us. If it does not happen in a month or so Steve suggests setting up a new website with a new domain. By the end of July or early August our two-year website renewal fee is due, and we need to figure this out before that deadline happens. We need to get in touch with the club member on the phone and or talk in person to figure this out. Board members also discussed the show trailer and making sure we maintain access to it in the future.

Workshop Location: Cheryl gave a rundown of some of her recent work on a new workshop by locating grants. Cheryl contacted Central Carolina Community Foundation who connects organizations with grants. Cheryl discussed our club's purpose and what we need, and she was given the name of two grants. Cheryl also contacted SCORE (Service Corps of Retired Executives) who works with nonprofits. A SCORE rep promised to connect her to another organization that can help us. Tom has put the grant information on the workspace. Cheryl is checking listings for workshop locations every day. She is also looking into specific modular buildings. Richland County planning division says building needs to be meet HUD specifications. City of Columbia would have the same requirements. Patricia stated that she'd heard of the company, Boxable, which builds homes within a month but is not sure if it would meet our cost criteria since she hasn't seen the prices. Ron stated that the prices are reasonable, around \$19,000 to \$20,000. They bring everything to the site and set everything up. Casey stated the Amish have a similar thing where they ship log cabins. Shipping containers were also brought up as another option. but Cayce does not allow shipping container homes, and we would need to replace the floor as they're typically doused in chemicals to prevent pests. Steve suggested that if you could find 5 to 10 people to form a limited partnership you could buy a property and eventually pay off partners, but we would need to find people willing to do this. This might be a risky option.

Liaison: Jim stated that he updated our meeting place on the Southeast Federation website to list Hope Church instead of McKissick Museum.

Grants: Tom would like more feedback about the grants packet he previously handed out to the executive board members. Additionally, Tom has the certificate of incorporation from the original founders. It did not have the Columbia Gem and Mineral Society name. Patricia paid \$14.00 to get a certificate of continuation to prove that the organization exists.

EXECUTIVE MEETING MINUTES (continuation 2)

Additional Discussion: At our next meeting the club will have been in existence for 60 years. Patricia and Tom suggest that it might be neat to do something to celebrate at the meeting. Sophie suggested that it might be nice to do this at the silent auction meeting in June since we won't have to rush any speakers. Ron suggested we can get some old club photographs on the projector in the background of the auction. Casey suggested bringing a cake. At our next meeting the board members suggested asking the general membership if anyone would like to give a presentation or program this year. Patricia mentioned we need door prizes for May, August, September, and November. Ron stated he can put some door prizes together for May but will not be at the meeting and will need someone to bring them for him.

Patricia adjourned the meeting at 8:44 pm.

Meteorites

Southern delta Aquariids... July 18th, 2025, to August 12th, 2025

Next Peak night...Jul 29-30, 2025

These meteors produce good rates for a week centered on the night of maximum. These are usually faint meteors that lack both persistent trains and fireballs. In 2025, a waxing crescent moon will set before the radiant is high in the sky. Therefore, circumstances are favorable for viewing this shower during the morning hours.

Perseids...July 17th, 2025, to August 23rd, 2025

Next Peak night...May 3-4, 2025

The Perseids are active from July 14 to September 1. They reach a strong maximum on August 12 or 13, depending on the year. Normal rates seen from rural locations range from 50-75 shower members per hour at maximum.

News Worth Digging Up

NASA Mars rover captures rock that could hold fossilized microbes

NASA's Perseverance Mars rover <u>has made</u> what could be its most astonishing discovery to date: possible signs of ancient life on the Red Planet. "The six-wheeled robotic explorer came across an intriguing, arrow-shaped rock dubbed "Cheyava Falls" that may harbor fossilized microbes from billions of years ago, when Mars was a watery world." Perseverance drilled into the enigmatic rock to collect a core sample and carefully stowed beneath the rover's belly were it is destined to eventually return to Earth.

On earth, rocks that exhibit similar features " are often associated with the fossilized record of microbes living in the subsurface," said David Flannery, an astrobiologist and member of the Perseverance science team from the Queensland University of Technology in Australia. There is a tantalizing chance that Perseverance's <u>core sample</u> might contain actual fossilized microbes—potentially making history as the first proof of life beyond Earth.



Panning for gold May 10th at 136 Pine Lane, Union SC . There's a decent flat walk down to the creek to pan. It is an animal sanctuary so bring plant-based snacks and water. Contact Casey At (803) 319-4492 for questions

CGMS Field Trip to Graves Mountain

Lincoln, Georgia May 31st 5/31/2025. 11am- sundown or until you're tired. Graves Mountain has been a mecca for rockhounds for years. It is probably the most famous collecting site in Georgia. It is a premier location for large, multiple twinned rutile crystals; rutile, lazulite, pyrophyllite, kyanite, hematite, pyrite, ilmenite, muscovite, fuchsite, quartz crystals, and microcrystals. You can either surface collect or dig for minerals. There are also many boulders to bang on so you may want to bring a sledgehammer and a chisel. Just a reminder, you will not be able to drive into the site so you will have to carry your tools. One option is to bring a wagon to carry rocks and tools. Water and food as well.

Children under the age of 12 years old are not allowed on the mountain because of potential dangers. All pets must be kept under control and on a leash.

GRAVES MOUNTAIN CODE OF CONDUCT!

Park your vehicle in the designated area at the end of the paved access road. ALL pets must be kept under control and on a leash. The caretaker, Jr. Norman has final and absolute say as to where you may safely work. Ladders or power tools of any kind are not allowed. (HAND TOOLS ONLY!). STAY AWAY FROM ALL HIGH WALLS! NO RAPPELLING OFF OF ANYTHING! NO ONE IS ALLOWED TO DRIVE THEIR VEHICLE ON ANY PART OF GRAVES MOUNTAIN BEYOND THE PARKING AREA! (The caretaker must accompany anyone driving beyond the parking area!)

EVERYONE NEEDS TO BE OFF THE MOUNTAIN BY 6:00 p.m. (Absolutely no one is allowed on Graves Mountain after dark.)

DIRECTIONS: From Washington Georgia, drive east 11 miles on SR-378, look for mine entrance on right. From the Hardee's in Lincolnton, Georgia, drive approximately 5-1/2 miles west on SR-378. Look for the sign at the entrance to Graves Mountain on the left side of the road. It is a little over a two-hour drive from Columbia.
