It saddens me to report the Loss of Chris. She was incredibly supportive of the Columbia Gem and Mineral Society. Always so down to earth and took time to give the club behind the scenes tour of the museum. She was very willing to answer any questions. Always a joy to be around.

#### **Chris CiCimurri**

McKissick Museum staff, Advisory Council members, and the USC community mourn the loss of Christian Maloney Cicimurri, Curator of Collections, who passed away on May 28, 2023.

Christian was born November 1, 1970, in Plainfield, New Jersey. After graduating from Hunterdon Central HS, Christian attended Douglass College, from which she graduated in 1993. During the summer of 1994, she met her future husband, Dave, in Chamberlain, South Dakota, where they spent two weeks digging up fossils of giant sea turtles and crocodile-like marine lizards. They re-connected in Badlands National Park during the summer of 1995. They both attended the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, where they each earned an MS in Paleontology. Prior to graduating, Christian accepted Dave's hand in marriage on June 28, 1997.

Christian and Dave moved to upstate South Carolina in 1999, where both worked at the Campbell Geology Museum at Clemson University. In 2011, the family (son Morgan was born in 2004) moved to Columbia, SC, where Christian joined the staff at the McKissick Museum at the University of South Carolina. From 2011 - 2014, Christian served as project manager for two consecutive Institute of Museum of Library Services' Museums for America grants where she inventoried and cataloged the museum's historically significant natural science collections encompassing nearly 75,000 rocks, minerals, fossils, gemstones, and modern shells, as well as safely rehoused 700 radioactive specimens. Though there were many crowning achievements in her career, one came in the fall of 2018 when she was awarded \$460,315 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services for another Museums for America grant, this time to expand the **Historic Southern Naturalists** project to include holdings at the Charleston Museum. After 18 years in the museum field, Christian accepted her first full-time job as the Curator of Collections for McKissick Museum in March of 2018. Christian curated, cared for, and researched the Museum's collection, and she planned and installed numerous exhibits on subjects ranging from textiles, decorative arts, university history, and natural science. She also taught geology classes for several years as an adjunct lecturer for the School of the Earth, Ocean and Environment.

Christian was an inspiration to her students, interns, volunteers, colleagues, and friends. Her encyclopedic knowledge of topics ranging from natural history and geology, such as identifying trilobite fossils and citing the chemical make-up of feldspar, to textiles, for example, dating period clothing and fanciful hand sewing stitches by sight, to quickly gaining mastery of stoneware and silver in the Museum's collection, was incredible. Additionally, she came to be thought of as the foremost expert on the Past Perfect database collections management system in the state of South Carolina. Her willingness to teach and share all that she knew, both professionally and personally, was a gift.

We will miss her smile, her positive and sunny disposition, the seriousness with which she took her work in stewarding museum collections, her versatility, her strength, and her boundless energy that carried her until the end. *Copied from McKissick Museum*

# **Graves Mountain**

Graves Mountain is a unique geological formation located in Lincoln County, Georgia.

"Beginning in the 1920's, Tiffany's mined the site for rutile, a substance used for polishing diamonds. At some point thereafter, Aluminum Silicates, Inc. began mining the site for kyanite, a mineral used to make heat-resistant products. Sometime in the mid-1960's, Combustion Chemicals, Inc.was formed to purchase the site and conduct kyanite mining operations. Combustion Chemicals was a wholly owned subsidiary of Combustion Engineering Inc. Combustion Chemicals conducted mining operations until 1984, when it sold the property to Pasco Mining Company. Pasco operated the mine site until November 1, 1986, at which time the facility and all environmental responsibilities reverted back to Combustion Chemicals by their previous purchase agreement. Combustion Chemicals never resumed mining operations. In 1990, it was merged into Combustion Engineering Inc. In 1990, C-E became a wholly owned subsidiary of Asea Brown Boveri (ABB), a Swiss-Swedish multinational conglomerate based in Zurich and one of the largest electrical engineering companies in the world. The merged company spent 1.6+ million dollars in reclamation costs through the late 1990's. Combustion Engineering was also sued by 16 surrounding property owners for acid run off in 1991." **Reprint From Georgia Mineral Society** 

Currently the mine has become a haven for mineral collectors. There are not many places where folks have the opportunity to collect Rutile, Kyanite, Lazulite, Iridescent Hematite, Pyrophyllite, Pyrite, Ilmenite, Fuchsite, Barite, Sulfur, variscite, woodhouseite, crandallite, strengite, phosphosiderite, cacoxenite, blue quartz, and quartz crystals. Just ask Susan Bloodworth who "took Julian Shumpert to Graves Mountain for his birthday and his first official dig. To make everything even better, he found the specimen of the day, a peacock ore point. The other diggers oohed over Julian's find. He kept his treasure in his pocket the rest of the day so he could show it to all the other Rock Diggers and at the Rock Swap. This was a wonderful experience for all."


