October 16, 2023, Monthly Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society, Inc. held its monthly meeting on October 16, 2023, at McKissick Museum. President Jim Cobb called the meeting to order at 7:31 PM. Jim stated we still need volunteers to work the show and passed around a sign-up sheet. Jim thanked Ron Ahle for door prizes and Sue Shrader, Adam Parris and Sheila Frame for refreshments. Ron announced the door prizes were from donations and his own collection. Jim asked for introduction of new members and visitors. The door prize and snacks sign-up sheet was passed around.

Membership: Sheila Frame announced that the club now has 116 members, 95 adults and 21 juniors.

Show:

EXECUTIVE MEETING MINUTES

October 23, 2023, Board Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society held its executive board meeting on October 23, 2023, at Grecian Gardens Restaurant. President Jim Cobb called the meeting to order at 7:07 PM. In attendance were Jim Cobb (President), Ron Ahle (Secretary), Jonathan Wenzel (Vice-President), Gary Hert (Shop), Cheryl Coker (Shop), Steve Coker (Web), Sheila Frame (Membership), Sue Shrader (Programs), Angela Valvasori (Treasurer), Mandie Wenzel (Show Committee) and Sharon Sterrett (Show Committee). Jim thanked everyone in attendance and reminded the board that this would be the last meeting before the show.

Show: Sharon stated that we have 25 paid vendors so far and handed out the current draft layout. Sharon informed the Board that that a non-profit organization had requested a table and the board agreed it would be okay if they are grouped with the demonstrators in the back of the show. Sharon stated that we have four more vendors lined up (two from Graves Mountain) pending contracts and payments. Mandie said she was already preparing dealer contracts for the 2024 show that could be handed out at the 2023 show. Sue said she had secured advertisement in the Free Times, Lexington Chronicle, and the Columbia Star. Sue encouraged everyone to pass out show flyers and to share show info on social media. Mandie will have flyers printed as needed. Angela reminded the Board that a show preparation meeting with Jamil needed to be scheduled. Mandie informed the board that security cost has increased, and she asked the board for a motion to allow her to cover the increased cost. Knowing the importance of security, a motion was made and passed. It was suggested that maybe we should enter a multi-year contract for security to reserve a fixed price. Mandie reminded the group about the Education Day for students on Friday during the show and asked if she could have some special "grab bags" made for the students that contain fossils and minerals. Finally, it was mentioned that Josh McDuffie has arranged a spot on "The Point" (FM 100.7) in which Angela will promote our show. We still need help for set-up.

Program Coordinator: Sue Shrader announced that Kim Cochran will be giving a presentation next year at our April meeting. She also said that Bailey Parker would be speaking on the Gills Creek Watershed. Sue reminded the board that meeting nights in January would be reversed. **Membership:** Sheila Frame announced that the club now has 120 members, 97 adults and 23 juniors. **Historian:** Angela informed the board that many files including the Rocky Trails have been uploaded to google workspace. **Newsletter:** Ron asked for input for the newsletter.

Treasurer: Angela stated the Square system for payment to the club was up and running and that she had written up instructions on how to use the system for taking credit card payments at the show. Angela coordinated with Steve to set up an online membership payment system through our website. Discussion ensued about having a credit card fee on membership dues and the group decided to revisit the subject next year. Angela evaluated the online system and said it works and gives a receipt immediately. Some dealers have already started using the credit card system for paying for tables. Angela finished by giving her standard treasurer report. **Website:** Steve put "Square" buttons on the website for membership renewals. On donations, it was suggested to have mineral-themed levels of donations with rewards of certificates, membership dues and maybe free show tickets. Steve stated the previous website domain (which is linked to CGMS.rocks) is with GoDaddy and Mike Montebello paid for a three-year renewal. Sue said she was adding information about the show to

Facebook and had conducted a three-day boost from which a 10-day "likes" report would be generated. Sue also reported that Jason Dolinski is now a co-administrator and that members are encouraged post on our Facebook site. Acknowledging that our Instagram account was gone, Angela stated it would be good to re-establish it and possibly have a YouTube video made about the club.

Shop: Gary announced that the cabbing and polishing machines were up and running in the workshop. He said members should contact him if they are interested in using them. Cheryl reported that she and Carol Elliot had attended an excellent online seminar on grants. She reported that Carol was looking into a potential property for our shop.

New Business: Sheila announced that our Google Workspace account had been activated. Angela said the workspace would be a password protected site for storing show files, Rocky Trails, logos, patch designs, bylaws, etc. Angela agreed to have a demonstration on the features and use of the workspace at the January Board meeting. On a separate subject, Angela asked about setting up the geode saw at festivals as a way of making income and promoting our club. Gary said it would be a lot of work and require a lot of volunteers.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting and Jim adjourned the meeting at 8:48 PM.

55th Annual CGMS Gem, Mineral and Jewelry Show

Show Reminders to All Members:

- 1. We will need volunteers to work at the Salted Mine and Grab Bag Stations at the Show.
- 2. The club will host the popular Dealers' Dinner on the Thursday night after the dealers set up their booths. The club will furnish meats, plates, and utensils. Volunteers are needed to contribute salads, side dishes, drinks, and ice. These contributions should be brought to Jamil Temple no later than 5:00 pm Thursday, November 16, 2023. The dealers very much enjoy and appreciate this after a hard day of setting up their booths and it provides an opportunity for club members to meet and eat with the dealers.
- 3. Club and Show Publicity: Angela Valvasori will be on "The Point" FM 100.7 at 8:35 am Wednesday Nov. 15 to promote the Show. She will also appear on Soda City Live on WIS TV at 3 pm on Wednesday Nov. 15 to promote CGMS with a mention of the Show.

2023 CGMS Gem & Mineral Show Volunteer Instructions

The following information is being provided for folks who are either considering volunteering to work at the show or have already volunteered. Volunteer hours will be tallied, and for every four hours worked, your name is entered in a drawing for a lapidary class scholarship at William Holland or Wild Acres. Hours are tracked by signing in and out.

The following description of the duties will help you decide what you would like to volunteer for and what will be expected from you. A more detailed description will be provided prior to the Show, and someone will be available to help during the Show.

<u>Front Desk Instructions – Collecting Admissions</u>

- 1. We accept cash, check, or credit cards. The Treasurer provides a cash box. The Treasurer, Angela Valvasori, will help with credit card payments, using Square.
- 2. The daily admission fees are as follows:
 - a. \$6/person for people over 16 who are not military and do not have a \$1 off coupon. Children 16 and under are free and do not need to show ID. Military (active and retired) and military spouse and children are free with military ID. Ask to see ID.
 - b. \$5/person with a paper or electronic coupon. One coupon per person. Put paper coupons in the basket. Have them show you the electronic coupon on their phone.
 - c. On Friday only, we also offer a 3-day pass. Give them the printed pass.
- 3. In the provided notebook, note the number of military and dependents entering, number of electronic coupons and number of 3-day passes sold. These are used to calculate attendance.

Front Desk Instructions – Tickets and Door Prize Forms

We use the tickets to allow people to exit and return on the same day, and we use the ticket start and end numbers to count attendance each day.

- 1. Mark the starting ticket number and ending ticket number in the notebook.
- 2. Give each adult one ticket. The tickets come in identical pairs. Give the attendee one ticket and put the other ticket in the bin.
- 3. Hand each adult a door prize form. Ask them to fill it out at the table and put it the door prize form box. Tell them there is a drawing every hour and they must be present to win. Tell them there is a grand prize drawing at the end of the show and they do not have to be present, we will call them.

Front Desk Instructions - Door Prizes

- 1. Ensure the microphone is working and extra batteries are available.
- 2. Ensure there are sufficient door prizes ready to start the day. Put door prizes in the large jewelry case, with the door prize form that identifies the item and who donated it.
- 3. Vendors and club members donate door prizes on a voluntary basis. Some vendors bring their door prizes to you. If more are needed, you can ask other vendors if they would like to donate a door prize.

- 4. Conduct Door Prize drawing hourly, starting one hour after the show opens. After the drawing, collect the cards from the box and bundle them together. They will be kept for the grand prize drawing.
- 5. Announce the door prize winner using the microphone and tell the winner to come to the door prize desk to collect the prize.
- 6. The grand door prize is Schorl (Black Tourmaline) donated by Cannaco Collections and is in a display case. Conduct the drawing for the grand door prize at the end of the show using all the door prize cards. A person does not have to be present to win. Call the winner and arrange for them to pick it up.
- 7. Ask a vendor if they are willing to donate a grand prize for next year.

Front Desk Instructions – Grab Bags

- 1. Collect money for the grab bags. The cash box is provided by the Treasurer at the start of the day. The cash box is shared with the salted mine. We also accept checks and credit cards. The Treasurer, Angela Valvasori, will help with credit card payments, using Square.
- 2. We have \$1, \$5, and \$10 grab bags. They are arranged on the desk and a sample of each is displayed. Replenish grab bags as needed. Grab bags are made up prior to the show.
- 3. Help people identify the minerals and fossils in their grab bags, if asked.

Front Desk Instructions -Salted Mine

- 1. Collect the money: \$1 for 2 scoops and assist the kids scooping and screening. Provide the kids with a bag for their finds.
- 2. The cash box is provided by the Treasurer at the start of the day. The cash box is shared with the grab bags. We also accept checks and credit cards. The Treasurer, Angela Valvasori, will help with credit card payments, using Square.
- 3. The salted mine is set up on Thursday to be ready to go on Friday morning. Replenish the salted mine with fresh material as needed. The material is under the desk.

Instructions – Geodes

- 1. The volunteer options are: (1) selling the geodes, (2) cutting the geodes, (3) cleaning the geodes, bagging them, and giving them to the customers. Select one station. The geode station is outdoors so dress for the weather.
- 2. Selling the geodes: The uncut geodes and samples of cut geodes are placed on the tables.
 - a. Price is \$1.25/ounce. Customer selects uncut geode. Weigh geode, calculate price and collect money. The Treasurer provides the cash box. We also accept checks and credit cards. The Treasurer, Angela Valvasori, will help with credit card payments, using Square.
 - b. Tell the customer how long it will take to cut the geode (cutting crew will tell you as time varies depending on backlog) and where to pick it up. Write the customer's name on the paper bag and give it with the geode to the cutting crew.
- 3. Gary Hert will train the cutting crew. This involves operating the cutting saw.
- 4. Gary Hert will also train the cleaning and bagging crew.

Every opportunity I was given to talk with him was a blessing. He was truly nature's ambassador. We will miss him dearly.

McKissick Museum's professional and student staff, and advisory council, past and present, mourn the loss of our colleague **Rudy Mancke**.

The following are some kind words about Rudy from "ColaDailey.com"

Rudy Mancke, who will be remembered for passing on his love of nature to countless people in South Carolina and beyond, died November 7 at the age of 78.

Mancke's wife, Ellen, told South Carolina Public Radio that her husband died surrounded by family after a battle with liver disease.

Mancke, a naturalist in residence and adjunct faculty member at the University of South Carolina, was best known as host of NatureScene on SCETV and NatureNotes on SC Public Radio. NatureScene ran for 25 years, beginning in 1978. Mancke also founded the South Carolina Association of Naturalists and served as a curator at the South Carolina State Museum and as a high school biology teacher.

"Rudy's boundless enthusiasm, deep knowledge and dedication to environmental education have left an enduring legacy that will continue to inspire future generations," SCETV President and CEO Adrienne Fairwell said. "His impact on our organization and the people of South Carolina is immeasurable."

"Rudy Mancke was a South Carolina treasure. He had a profound impact on the education of South Carolinians of every age," said USC College of Arts and Sciences Dean Joel Samuels. "From nature talks on the USC Horseshoe to his beloved series on public radio and television, he was the epitome of a high-impact scholar dedicated to sharing his love for science and the natural world. He will be greatly missed."

USC is planning an on-campus celebration of Mancke's life, with details to be announced.

News Worth Digging Up

This month's focus is on something I like digging for: dinosaurs with two worthy entries.

Paleontologists Find Fossil of Early Megaraptorid Dinosaur in Australia

Paleontologists have unearthed a well-preserved, almost complete left frontal (part of the skull roof) of a previously unknown species of megaraptorid dinosaur in the upper Strzelecki Group (earliest Cretaceous) of Victoria, Australia. The new specimen provides limited support for the hypothesis that megaraptorid dinosaurs might have originated in Australia. Megaraptoridae is a family of theropods that lived in different regions of Gondwana during the Cretaceous period. These carnivorous dinosaurs had large hand claws and robust forelimbs, which were usually reduced in size in other large theropods such as *T. rex*. The new megaraptorid specimen was unearthed at the locality of Shack Bay of the Lower Cretaceous Wonthaggi Formation in Victoria, Australia. The fossil dates back 120 million years old which means "It represents the geologically oldest megaraptorid skull element worldwide and emphasizes the prevalence of this theropod group in the mid-Cretaceous of Australia." said paleontologist Michael Cleeland (the finder of the fossil). One of the Last Surviving Non-Avian Dinosaurs Lived in Burrows, Had Super Senses: Study

New research demonstrates that the brain of *Thescelosaurus neglectus*, a small planteating neornithischian dinosaur that lived just before the end-Cretaceous mass extinction event around 66 million years ago, was relatively small (up to 12 feet in length) suggesting cognitive capabilities within the range of living reptiles. Other traits include a narrow hearing range, with limited ability to distinguish high frequencies, paired with an unusually well-developed sense of smell (olfaction) and vestibular sensitivity. In the new research, paleontologists David Button and Lindsay Zanno used a CT scanner to reconstruct soft tissues such as the brain and inner ear in the skull of *Thescelosaurus neglectus*. The researchers found that *Thescelosaurus neglectus*' poor cognitive and hearing abilities, coupled with powerful arms and legs and overdeveloped senses of smell and balance, are all features characteristic of animals that spend time underground and/or engage in digging behaviors today.

Orionids

Active from September 26th to November 22nd. The Orionids are a medium strength shower that sometimes reaches high strength activity. In a normal year, the Orionids produce 10-20 shower members at maximum. Peak Night: Oct 20-21, 2023. The moon will be 37% full.

Southern Taurids

Next period of activity: September 8 to December 2, 2023.

Northern Taurids

Next period of activity: October 13 to December 2, 2023.

Geminids

Next period of activity: November 19th, 2023, to December 24th, 2023

Next Peak night Dec 13-14, 2023

The Geminids are usually the strongest meteor shower of the year and meteor enthusiasts are certain to circle December 13 and 14 on their calendars. This is the one major shower that provides good activity prior to midnight as the constellation of Gemini is well placed from 22:00 onward. The Geminids are often bright and intensely colored. Due to their mediumslow velocity, persistent trains are not usually seen. These meteors are also seen in the southern hemisphere, but only during the middle of the night and at a reduced rate.

Ursids

Next period of activity: December 13th, 2023, to December 24th, 2023

Next Peak night Dec 21-22, 2023

The Ursids are often neglected due to the fact it peaks just before Christmas and the rates are much less than the Geminds, which peaks just a week before the Ursids. Observers will normally see 5-10 Ursids per hour during the late morning hours on the date of maximum activity. There have been occasional outbursts when rates have exceeded 25 per hour. These outbursts appear unrelated to the perihelion dates of comet 8P/Tuttle. This shower is strictly a northern hemisphere event as the radiant fails to clear the horizon or does so simultaneously with the start of morning twilight as seen from the southern tropics.

MARS: One Thousand One takes viewers away from planet Earth, into space, and across our solar system to our neighboring planet. Cayce Historical Museum

A highlight of the Cayce Historical Museum is the extensive collection of Native American artifacts. The collection was donated by the son of Samuel Watson, a local pharmacist who was an active collector in the area as well as other parts of the United States. This museum exhibit contains nearly 8,000 pieces including arrowheads, pottery, axes, tools, grinding stones, and more. These cultural materials were collected from South Carolina, the Southeast, and the Midwest. There are artifacts from the earliest prehistoric period like Clovis points as well as objects from every other period of the Native American history of the area.
