Jim thanked everyone in attendance. Jim thanked Ron for his presentation at the July meeting.

Show: Sharon stated that seven dealers had sent back completed contracts with payment. Sharon handed out a spreadsheet with all the dealers listed. About the Presentation for the August Meeting

David Shelly will give this month's program. The program title is "**Isotopes in Geology:** What is an isotope? Why are they important in the study of earth science?" Many people may hear the word in the context of discussing radioactive uranium or radiocarbon. Isotopes, however, are much more than that! Some are indeed radioactive, but many are not. It turns out that the "stable," isotopes are extremely important, too, for understanding all sorts of earth processes!

Dr. David Shelley, USC alumni and recent club member, will (1) give a basic introduction to isotopes (stable and radioactive), (2) share some examples of using carbon isotopes to understand both climate change and our own Congaree River Valley, and (3) give some teasers about other applications across various fields of geology.

News Worth Digging Up

Newly discovered whale species could have been heaviest animal ever.



The fossilized bones of an enormous ancient whale that patrolled coastal waters 40m years were found by fossil hunters in the Ica Desert of southern Peru. The bones of the newly discovered species indicate this whale is a contender for the heaviest animal ever to have existed on Earth with fully grown adults thought to weigh in the hundreds of tons according to researchers.

"It was very unlike anything I had seen before," said Alberto Collareta, a paleontologist at the University of Pisa who worked on the fossils. It is "the heaviest skeleton as far as mammals are concerned, possibly the heaviest vertebrate ever", he said. The new species, named *Perucetus colossus* after the country of origin and its gigantic size, could have grown larger and heavier than the blue whale (the blue whale was widely regarded to hold the record for the animal with the largest body size), the scientists said.


Writing in the journal Nature, Collareta and colleagues described how the fossils were discovered 13 years ago but took many years to prepare for study. Unlike most whales, which have relatively light skeletons and can prey on fast-moving fish and other marine creatures, *P. colossus* had heavier bones and was more likely a slow-swimming scavenger. The researchers reached the conclusion after comparing 13 vertebrae, four ribs and a single hip bone from *P. colossus* with bones from close whale relatives. Beyond its vast size, *P. colossus* appears to have had forelimbs for walking on the seabed and little, vestigial hind limbs.

alpha Capricornids

Next period of activity: July 7th, 2023, to August 15th, 2023. The alpha Capricornids are not a strong shower with a "plateau-like" maximum centered on July 31st. From the equator northward, they rarely more than five shower members per hour.

Southern delta Aquariids

Next period of activity: July 18th, 2023, to August 21st, 2023

Next Peak night **July 30-31, 2023**


The Delta Aquariids are another strong shower best seen from the southern tropics. North of the equator the radiant is located lower in the southern sky and therefore rates are less than seen from further south. These meteors produce good rates for a week centered on the night of maximum. These are usually faint meteors that lack both persistent trains and fireballs.




