News Worth Digging Up

Gemstone Discoveries: What Is the Likeliness of Finding a 'New' Gemstone?

"Professional gemmologists are often asked similar questions, like is there anything 'new' left to discover?" "states the Author, Pat Daly. The author concedes that gemmologists cannot know what might be discovered in the coming decades, but consideration of the many gem species and varieties which have been discovered in the past can indicate a likelihood of finding them in the future. In this article, the author gives a brief history of recent discoveries and list some of the new gemstones discovered in the 20th century such as sapphire-blue benitoite, kunzite, morganite, purple tanzanite, color-change diospore and sky blue larimar. In addition to these, other particularly interesting stones include ekanite, one of the few radioactive materials cut as a gemstone, taaffeite, the only mineral first discovered as a faceted stone and which was bought from a Dublin jeweler in 1945, brazilianite, a pleasing greenish-yellow gemstone named after its country of origin, and sinhalite, whose similar properties led to its confusion with peridot before it was recognized as a new mineral.

We have now entered a new century and already a new gem mineral, pezzottaite, from Madagascar, has made its way to the markets. It is not possible to predict the future, but new gemstones have been discovered recently in countries, such as Myanmar and Sri Lanka. Furthermore, new areas, such as Antarctica and the arctic regions of the northern hemisphere, areas covered by bogs, forests and deserts remain to be explored. "Based on what has happened in the past, we may look forward to future finds of gemstones; some will be familiar, but others may be wholly unexpected."

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Don't Forget the Solar Eclipse

The total solar eclipse will be visible along a narrow track stretching from Texas to Maine on April 8, 2024. A partial eclipse will be visible throughout all 48 contiguous U.S. states.

The path of the eclipse continues from Mexico, entering the United States in Texas, and traveling through Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. Small parts of Tennessee and Michigan will also experience the total solar eclipse. The eclipse will enter Canada in Southern Ontario, and continue through Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton. The eclipse will exit continental North America on the Atlantic coast of Newfoundland, Canada, at 5:16 p.m. NDT.


