ABOUT THE PRESENTATION

April 17, 2023 Monthly Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The presentation for the April meeting will be a lapidary arts presentation given by Danielle LoMonaco. Traditionally trained as a fine jeweler, Danielle has specialized in creating custom engagement rings, diamond setting, and jewelry repair for 7 years before she opened her own jewelry studio. She is accomplished in using fine jewelry techniques that bring a high level of quality to her silver work. According to Danielle, all of her pieces feature one-of-a-kind stones and hand-fabricated silver and silver wire. She states the labor is intensive work, often taking many hours or days to complete a single jewelry piece, but it is work she loves.

The presentation for the April meeting will be a lapidary arts presentation given by Danielle Danielle's jewelry starts with exceptional hand-cut and polished genuine stones from the most talented and reputable independent lapidary artists in the country. She chooses the stones carefully based on their natural beauty, quality, and unique patterns and colors. Some of her pieces feature stones cut and polished from rough rock specimens in her studio. Rare stones, including those that come from mines that have long been closed, are of particular interest to her. You will also find dinosaur bone, fossilized ancient sea life, and rare varieties of petrified wood in her work.

Using these outstanding stones as inspiration, she designs to celebrate their unique characteristics. As a designer she strives to compliment but not overpower the stones in her work, and to create something beautiful, comfortable, and made to last for years to come! Danielle believes that Nature is the ultimate artist, and her job is to create a custom, wearable frame worthy of her artwork.

EXECUTIVE MEETING MINUTES

March 27, 2023 Board Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society held its executive board meeting on March 27, 2023 at Grecian Gardens Restaurant. President Jim Cobb called the meeting to order at 7:10 PM. In attendance were Jim Cobb (President), Ron Ahle (Secretary), Gary Hert (Workshop Chair), Jonathan Wenzel (Vice-President), Sheila Frame (Membership), Mandie Wenzel, Sue Shrader (Programs), Sharon Sterrett, Laura Bailey and Angela Valvasori (Treasurer). Jim thanked the Wenzel's for giving us the opportunity to convene show meetings at their church.

Show: Mandie gave an update on the kick-off planning meeting for the 2023 show. Discussed during the planning meeting were increased rent at Jamil Temple and restructuring dealer contracts. There was lively discussion about how the organizational structure for the show committee should be done.

Program Coordinator: Sue said that Danielle LoMonaco will present on fine jewelry techniques and silver work. She also told the Board that I would be giving a presentation at the July meeting. She also proposed that we have a silent auction were we could sell recent donations to club members. Sheila reminded the Board that we still needed to fill the position of auctioneer. **Fieldtrips:** Ron gave an update on scheduled DMC fieldtrips and Graves Mountain. He also mentioned that the club should have a fieldtrip to Morris Island sometime this year. **Membership:** Sheila reported that we had 100 members. She also mentioned that some members preferred their addresses not be on the rooster and so she proposed to remove the addresses and the broad approved.

Treasurer: Angela updated the board on the best choices for point-of-sale options for the club. She reported that First Citizen's bank could provide the services we need, but it would be considerably more expensive than using Square or PayPal. She also researched the differences in technical support between Square and Zettle and found that both were about equivalent. Sue, who currently uses Square for her personnel business, informed the group that the app would need to be updated every six months. A motion was made and approved to purchase of the Square system Discussion ensued to determine which hardware to buy and it was suggested that we purchase two Square readers and one contactless reader. **Workshop:** Gary had no report and said that he would prefer to not have folks come to his house due to liability issues. Ron mentioned that some possibilities for workshop locations were being looked at and he reminded the group that the old workshop building was still vacant and wondered if we should consider making the owner a rental offer. **Website:** A recommendation was made that the website indicate that our shop is not functioning at this time. Sheila reminded folks that the storage rental could be used at a limited capacity. Another bit of news is that Angela has secured a QR code for our club that will link to the website where people can get show flyers and coupons.

Lyrids

Next Peak night: Apr 22-23, 2023; Next period of activity: April 15th to April 29th, 2023. The Lyrids are a medium strength shower that usually produces good rates for three nights centered on the maximum. These meteors also usually lack persistent trains but can produce fireballs. These meteors are best seen from the northern hemisphere where the radiant is high in the sky at dawn. Activity from this shower can be seen from the southern hemisphere, but at a lower rate.

eta Aquariids

Next Peak: The eta Aquariids will next peak on the May 5-6, 2023, night. On this night, the moon will be 100% full. The Eta Aquariids are a strong shower when viewed from the southern tropics. From the equator northward, they usually only produce medium rates of 10-30 per hour just before dawn. Activity is good for a week centered the night of maximum activity. These are swift meteors that produce a high percentage of persistent trains, but few fireballs.

News Worth Digging Up

A new study on Australian volcanoes has changed what we know about explosive 'hotspot' volcanism

A "new study published in Nature Geoscience on an ancient chain of Australian volcanoes is helping to change our understanding of "hotspot" volcanism.

"You may be surprised to learn eastern Australia hosts the longest chain of continental hotspot volcanoes on Earth. These volcanoes erupted during the last 35 million years (for 1 to 7 million years each), as the Australian continent moved over an area of heat (a hotspot) inside the planet, also known as a fixed heat anomaly or mantle plume."

"But it appears the Australian hotspot waned with time. And we have found the volcanoes' inner structure and eruptions changed as a result. Our new findings show hotspot strength has key impacts on the evolution of volcanoes' inner structure, along with their location and lifespan."

Willard: The Tale of an Enormous Triceratops Skeleton

This article tells the story of "an astounding fossilized *Triceratops prorsus* skeleton recently unearthed in the badlands of North Dakota; a specimen so massive that it may be the world's largest example of the species ever found!" Willard was found by fossil hunters in Montana in an area with exposure of "the Hell Creek Formation, a celebrated source of Late Cretaceous (68 to 66 million year old) dinosaur discoveries." It was a truly unprecedented find with the nasal horn and femur undeniably gigantic. Based on the femur and pelvic bone length, the excavation team estimated that Willard would stand two feet taller than any previously discovered skeleton. Being a one-of-a-kind *Triceratops* (who spans 28 feet long and 11.8 feet high) it was named "Willard" in honor of the former landowner.

The article goes on to explain in detail how the bones at the dig site were removed, marketed, and eventually restored for display in Switzerland. The amount of work that goes into restoring a specimen of this caliber is truly amazing! It's also an example of the valuable collaboration that often occurs amongst commercial diggers, dealers/brokers, and the museum community.


