### July 24, 2017 Board Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society, Inc.

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society met on the 4th Monday, July 24, 2017, at Grecian Gardens at 2312 Sunset Blvd., West Columbia, SC 29169. Members and officers present were Berina Sutphin, Angela Valvasori, Sue Shrader, Jimmy Armstrong, Ron Ahle, Jim Cobb, Dan Elswick, Gary Hert, Laura Tesh, Susan Bloodworth and Sharon Sterrett. President Jimmy Armstrong called the meeting to order at 7:02.

Committee and Officer Reports: Jimmy Armstrong reported that the Shop Inventory was sent to Laura Tesh. It was discussed that values needed to be added to the items. Jimmy will request that Gary Hert, David Dunlap and Mike Montebello research the items and assign values. As Treasurer, Laura Tesh said that when she is unavailable, authorized members can get access to the club check book by contacting Adam Tesh. The subject of an annual Workshop Fee was discussed. ### **Meteor Showers**

**Southern Delta Aquariids** Active from July 21st to August 23<sup>rd</sup>... Peak Night July 19 – 30, 2017The Delta Aquariids are another strong shower best seen from the southern tropics. North of the equator the radiant is located lower in the southern sky and therefore rates are less than seen from further south. These meteors produce good rates for a week centered on the night of maximum. These are usually faint meteors that lack both persistent trains and fireballs.

**Alpha Capricornids** Active from July 11th to August 10th ...Peak Night July 29 – 27, 2017The Alpha Capricornids are active from July 11 through August with a "plateau-like" maximum centered on July 29. This shower is not very strong and rarely produces in excess of five shower members per hour. What is notable about this shower is the number of bright fireballs produced during its activity period. This shower is seen equally well on either side of the equator.

**Perseids** Active from July 13th to August 26th Peak Night August 11 to 12, 2017The Perseids are the most popular meteor shower as they peak on warm August nights as seen from the northern hemisphere. The Perseids are active from July 13 to August 26. They reach a strong maximum on August 12 or 13, depending on the year. Normal rates seen from rural locations range from 50-75 shower members per hour at maximum. The Persesids are particles released from comet 109P/Swift-Tuttle during its numerous returns to the inner solar system. They are called Perseids since the radiant (the area of the sky where the meteors seem to originate) is located near the prominent constellation of Perseus the hero

# The Columbia Gem & Mineral Society August 21 Meeting is canceled due to the Total Solar Eclipse

On Aug. 21, 2017, a total solar eclipse will be visible from coast to coast. America will see its first total solar eclipse since 1979. The next one won't happen until April 2024.


On Aug. 21, 2017, a total solar eclipse will be visible from coast to coast, according to NASA. It will be the first total eclipse visible only in the USA since the country was founded in 1776. It will also be the first total solar eclipse to sweep across the entire country in 99 years, NASA says. And not since 1970 has there been an opportunity to see a total solar eclipse in such easily accessible and widespread areas of the nation. A total solar eclipse occurs when the moon gets in the way of the sun, turning day to an eerie twilight. Barring pesky clouds, more Americans should be able to see this one than ever before as it passes through 12 states. The eclipse will start on the West Coast in Oregon and trace a 67-mile wide path east across the country, finally exiting the East Coast in South Carolina. At any given location, the total eclipse will last for around 2 or 3 minutes.

It will pass directly over cities such as Salem, Ore., Idaho Falls, Lincoln, Neb., Kansas City, Nashville, and **Columbia and Charleston, S.C**. Places within a one- or two-hour drive of the eclipse include Portland, Ore., Boise, Cheyenne, Rapid City, Omaha, Neb., Topeka, St. Louis, Louisville, Knoxville, Chattanooga, Atlanta and Charlotte. At 2:41 p.m. viewers who have gathered in the Greater Columbia, S.C., area will experience the longest period of 100% total eclipse for a metro area on the entire East Coast of the United States — ranging from 2 minutes and 30 seconds to 2 minutes and 36 seconds of total darkness.

An estimated 12 million people live within the path of totality, according to <u>Space.com</u>. The number of people within just one day's drive of the totality zone is around 200 million.

And in Columbia, S.C., the city is expecting and preparing for visitors to come to the region due to its unique location in the path and "to celebrate and witness the spectacle of totality," said Merritt McNeely of the South Carolina State Museum

An Official Field Trip of the Knoxville Gem & Mineral Society (Knoxville, TN) (HOST)

An Official Field Trip of the Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

Saturday, September 30, 2017 10:00 AM Eastern (9 am Central) Clarkesville, GA Fee: \$10 per person

**TRIP:** This location is located in a band of kyanite bearing material. The material has been moved around so the kyanite is not in situ. Small blades are easy to find, but digging and some perseverance is required to find the larger specimens. This site is fun and productive site for all ages.

**COLLECTING:** Kyanite blades and cobbles, small mica books, and graphite specimens (rare). The kyanite ranges from gray to pale blue and may contain graphite. Some of the blades can be polished and, because of the graphite, they have a curious depth and shimmer when they are polished.

**BRING:** Small blades can be found weathering out onto the surface. Bigger blades and cobbles are found by digging 8" to 24" deep. You will need scratching tools and baggies for surface collecting, and a shovel and pick for digging. **All holes must be refilled**. This site can be muddy at times, so a change of clothes would be good too.

**FACILITIES:** There are no bathroom facilities at the site, but there is a McDonald's Restaurant in Clarksville and also restrooms at a public park a few miles from where we will be collecting. The Knoxville Gem & Mineral Society members will have free water and snacks available for everyone.

**CHILDREN:** This field trip is suitable for children but they must be supervised at all times.

**PETS:** Because this is a working farm, pets are not allowed.

**SAFETY:** There are electrified fences on the farm so <u>do not</u> touch any fences. Field trip leads will open and close gates. This is a working farm and there may be animals present – <u>do not</u> approach any of the animals. <u>Do not</u> enter pastures where animals are present.


